



CHAPLAIN FIELD REPORTS

Over the Thanksgiving holiday, our Chaplains ministered in the following ways:

—Several Chaplains took part in ride alongs and visited with First Responders at their stations across our service area during the holiday week and weekend. Ride alongs and station visits are the primary ways that our Chaplains build relationships with their First Responders.

—Two Chaplains helped the Beulah Baptist Association provide breakfast for Person County First Responders on Thanksgiving morning. More than 30 Responders were served as they rotated duty between 6am and 9am.

Crisis Response Teams were busy over the Thanksgiving holiday period:

- Two Chaplains responded to a request for service where a woman had been found dead by family members. Both Chaplains were on the scene for over 5 hours as Law Enforcement investigated. They ministered to several family members and neighbors while there.
- Chaplains responded to three different death scenes on Thanksgiving Day. It is suspected that heroin was involved in two of those deaths.
- Chaplains were on scene with Law Enforcement for a DWI checkpoint on the weekend prior to Thanksgiving.
- On a suicide scene, one of our Chaplains was able to share the gospel with five family members who were concerned about their loved ones' eternal destiny.
- An EMS Supervisor requested a Chaplain to respond to a working cardiac arrest call to minister to an elderly patient's wife. The wife had found her husband unresponsive and started CPR. He was pronounced dead at the scene after 45

CHAPLAIN SPOTLIGHT

Chaplain Lavette Williams joined Emergency Chaplains in October 2018. She currently serves with the Durham Crisis Response Team (CRT).

Chaplain Williams volunteers one day per week to serve First Responders and those in crisis in Durham County. This involves being on-call to assist the public and any First Responders in need of a Chaplain.

She is a member of Faith Assembly Christian Center in Durham where she also serves as a Care Team Member. She graduated in 2017 with a Masters Degree in Pastoral Counseling from Liberty University Baptist Theological Seminary in Lynchburg, VA.
